

POLITICAL LINEUP DARKS SOCIALISTS

Party Will Not Seek To Form
Cabinet When Spanish
Assembly Meets

MADRID (AP) Special.—Socialists decided in constructive attitude. It would be "irresponsible" in the course of the republic to try to form a cabinet to succeed the present coalition provisional government when the latter resigns at convocation of the National Assembly next Thursday.

The proposal was made on the ground that its sponsors believed a Socialist cabinet could bring "order out of chaos in Spain." The proposal was defeated by a majority vote of the Socialists.

The possibility of Socialist control of the Assembly when it convenes was believed Saturday to have been removed by an agreement for concerted action on the part of various Republican groups.

Left wing Republicans under Juan Garcia, and the Nationalist and other Foreign Spanish Ministers under Foreign Minister Mariano Barrio, agreed to maintain their discipline during the assembly of the left.

Such an alliance means the left Republicans will have a bloc of at least 160 seats while the Socialists will have only an estimated 112. Although they emerged from the recent elections as the most popular party.

The move caused a widespread belief that the Social Minister Lerroux may announce the final breakdown of the constitutional government.

FATAL MINE MISHAPS DECREASE IN ALABAMA

Inspector's Report Shows Fewer Deaths Of State Workers In First Half Of Year

Fatal accidents in Alabama coal mines are less than one third as many this first six months of this year, than for the same period last year, according to records announced by U.S. Coal Mine Inspector Hillhouse showing 11 deaths for the half of year, 1931, compared with 35 in 1930.

Inspector Hillhouse says that the decrease in deaths is due to the fact that the coal mines in Alabama are now being operated in a more careful and systematic manner.
