PLANES ENDURE, CREWS FALTER

Reliability Tour Seems Now More a Human Than a Mechanical Test.

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 26.—Pilots and passengers aboard the fleet of planes in the National Air Tour had grown a little weary of their 6,000-mile flight around the western rim of the United States but their machines were still in good trim for the three days and 655 miles remaining between them and Detroit, their goal, when they prepared to leave here today for Wausau and Milwaukee. Tomorrow the caravan pushes on to Chicago for an overnight stop and returns Saturday afternoon to Detroit, where it began its flight in the annual reliability contest for the Edsel Ford trophy, 27 days ago.

Twenty-four of the original starters in the contest and its two accompanying planes were still in the line-up and aviation enthusiasts were pointing to this fact as proof of the reliability of the modern commercial airplane but pilots and passengers, who have been feted with veritable Lindbergh receptions in most of the 27 cities they have visited, were not all so enthusiastic.

HUMAN PROBLEM.

Harvey Campbell, vice-president and secretary of the Detroit Board of Commerce, expressed the view of more than one when he said the tour was no longer a question of mechanical but human endurance, and complained of having "to wait daily for my suit to be pressed and the continuous chicken diet."

Campbell has promised the tour party a cordial reception in Detroit but guaranteed there will be no chicken on the menu and the orchestra will not play Ramona. Every band and orchestra on the tour has played Ramona at least once in every town the tour has stopped, Mr. Campbell said, except Missoula, Mon. There the Blackfoot River, rushing down its rocky bed, was the only orchestra, and trout were served from the same stream.

A NATIVE SON.

Wausau, a thriving lumbering community in central Wisconsin, is the noon stop today. It is the home of John P. Wood, the young Waco pilot, and the natives plan a special reception for him. He now has sufficient lead over the field so that he has only to finish to win the trophy and the bulk of the \$14,000 in prizes.

Frank Hawks, pilot of the Ford tri-motor, is Wood's strongest opponent for first place and there is still considerable competition among the first ten, the others of whom stand as follows:
