## Springfield Next Stop of Air Tour Aviators

### 25 Fly From St. Louis at Wichita Tonight

**SPRINGFIELD, Mo., July 2.—(U.P.)** Robert Canwell, in a Lockheed monoplane, was the first of the 25 national air tourists to arrive here today. Landing at exactly 11 a. m., his flying time from St. Louis was one hour and 44 minutes. Allev the planes had landed at 12:34 p. m.

**ST. LOUIS, Mo., July 2.—(U.P.)**—Springfield, Mo., was to be the next stop of the 25 planes of the national air tour, formerly known as the Ford reliability tour, which took off at one minute intervals starting at 9 this morning from Lambert-St. Louis field.

The planes landed here Saturday afternoon. Each made the flight from Detroit, with a stopover at Indianapolis with a perfect score.

The caravan will spend tonight in Wichita, Kan. Beginning Tuesday the planes will visit Tulsa, Ok., Fort Worth, Waco, San Antonio, Marfa, and El Paso, Texas; Tucson and Yuma, Ariz.; San Diego and Los Angeles, Cal.; Medford and Portland, Oerogn; Tacoma and Spokane, Wash.; Missoula, Great Falls, Mont.; Minot, S. D.; Fargo, N. D.; Minneapolis, St. Paul; Chicago and Battle Creek, Mich., arriving at Detroit July 28.

A plane in which were Lieut. Frank Tinsdale, Washington; James F. Frenzell, Indianapolis newspaper man, and Erik Hildershausen, London, newspaper man, arrived here tardily Sunday. It had been delayed in Detroit. The plane will hop off with the caravan today.

Every ship but two was credited with a perfect score.

John P. Wood of Wassau, Wis., is leading the reliability caravan (thus far with a pointage of 1,700.8 for the first day of flying. Frank M. Hawks, flying a Ford tri-motor transport, is second with 1,596, with P. D. Sowers third in a Stinson-Detroiter. Charles W. Meyers stands fourth with his Waco 10, while fifth place is held by Eddie Stinson in another Stinson-Detroiter.

All members of the tour took off from the field on schedule. Perfect flying conditions, including a brilliant sun and a cloudless, windless sky, favored the St. Louis-Springfield leg.

Before Clayton left last Wednesday for Van Buren, Pine Bluff and Rudy he purchased a new necktie and belt at the Palace Clothing Co. store here and reports from Rudy marked the clothes the man wore by the necktie.

### HAS'N'T RETURNED HERE

Clayton took about \$200 with him and was to go first to Van Buren and Pine Bluff, then to Rudy and to return today, Witter said. He had not returned this afternoon. A sister, from Muskogee, was on her way to Rudy to attempt identification of the body.

J. L. Bird of Fort Smith found the body. He was one of a party of fishermen and had dropped his line to the bottom of the pond where the hook became entangled with some wire. The body was pulled to the surface. It had been weighted down with rocks fastened by barbed wire. The man had been shot through the side of the head at close range, apparently, for there were powder burns. His hands had been tied with stout cord.

### SHOTS WERE HEARD

The man was about 55 years of age, of medium height and weight and with blond hair tinged with gray, the fishermen reported. Only his union suit, shirt and the necktie remained of his clothing, the first reports from Arkansas said.

### WEEVIL ALL OUT

**WASHINGTON, July 2.—(U.P.)**—Boll weevil emergence between June 1 and June 15 as reported to the Department of agriculture from 15 experimental stations either stopped altogether or declined so sharply as to indicate that emergence is almost complete.

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
