PLANES START ON FINAL LAP

National Air Tour Group Swings Northward on the "Home Stretch"

DALLAS, TEX., July 8.—(P)—Just one minute and seven seconds behind schedule time, Frank Hawks, piloting a Ryan Brougham airplane, with his wife as passenger, crossed the finish line at Love Field at 3:31:7 p. m. today, as the first ship of the national air tour to reach Dallas on the hop from Pine Bluff, Ark., Hawks' official time for the 295 mile jaunt was 2 hours 22 minutes and 7 seconds. The slowest of the planes made the trip in a little more than three hours.

Three seconds after the propellers of Hawk's ship ceased to spin, Charles W. Meyers, in a Waco Whirlwind, swooped down upon the city's new municipal field. Others of the group of 14 official entries arrived at intervals during the next hour.

The field was thronged with a welcoming crowd, and it was with difficulty that police kept the paths clear from midfield, where the machines landed, to the roadway, where they were lined up for inspection and re-fuelling. The fliers were officially greeted by members of the Dallas flying club and by city officials.

The fliers will take off from Love Field Saturday morning at 10 o'clock en route back to Detroit, stopping at Oklahoma City at 11 a. m. From Oklahoma City they will go to Tulsa, arriving there at 3:30 p. m., where they will spend Saturday night.

USURY CHARGE ON C. D'MILLE

Millionaire Film Producer Got \$12,000 for \$62,000 Loan Is Charge

LOS ANGELES, July 8.—(P)—\$100,000,000 Julian Petroleum scandal penetrated more deeply the ranks of prominent men when Cecile B. De Mille, million film producer and bank director charged with usury.

The complaint was issued by J. J. Lickley, city prosecutor, who is conducting a second investigation of alleged usurious participation of a score of men in refinancing J. Pool loans.

The complaint against the producer charges that De Mille let the corporation \$62,000 for 45 collecting interest of more than 10 per cent or about \$12,000.

The prosecutor said his complaint against the alleged usuries would continue and that he contemplates granting immunity to no one.

Already more than 50 persons have been indicted, by the grand jury, in connection with the stock sale. Among these were some of the prominent bankers, business men, and theatrical producers in Southern California. They are charged with offenses ranging from misdemeanors to felonies.

KILLED HIS OWN HORSE

BURWELL, NEB., July 8.—(P)—H. Tatlow, living near here, is under arrest charged with killing his own horse for the purpose of collecting \$600 insurance. Charles Winter and George Fickel are charged with selling accessories before the fact, Clarence White and John Sharp are charged with accessories after the fact. All were before preliminary hearing and were bound over for trial in the district court.
